The Last Great Ape Organization - LAGA January 2008 Report



Highlights

- A retired military officer is arrested for trading in gorilla meat.
- MINFOF Minister's new year's wishes singles out LAGA and fight against corruption.
- LAGA makes a full presentation at the **Central African Head of police Conference** on the **fight against wildlife crime** and the involvement of the police in this fight.

General

A retired military officer has been arrested in Abong Mbang in the East province illegally trading in gorilla meat. He is now behind bars. The dealer was caught with a consignment of meat from an industrial refrigerator for sale including the legs and heads of gorillas. He attempted to corrupt the arresting officers and has connections to a member of parliament from the area who also attempted to corrupt the arresting officers and the State Counsel without success.

LAGA participated in the **New Year wishes to Minister** of Forestry and Wildlife who in his New Year speech was **strong against corruption** and **singled out LAGA** in his congratulations to NGOs working in **collaboration with his ministry**.

LAGA makes a full presentation at the **Central African Head of Police Conference** on the **fight against wildlife crime** and the involvement of the police in this fight. LAGA participated in the high level meeting of Heads of Police and Interpol of Central Africa and was represented by the Head of Legal Department, Horline Njike, the youngest participant. She was given the chance to do a full presentation on ivory trafficking during this event. Her **work with the Interpol on the big ivory case** got LAGA to participate in this Conference.

Investigations

- **14 investigations** of varying lengths were carried out in **6 provinces** including North West, South West, East, South and Center.
- Investigations led to a **successful operation** in Abong Mbang, **East Province**. A dealer was arrested trying to sell **gorilla parts** (head and limbs) and he was put behind bars.
- A new investigator was sent to for a **field test** with a **positive feedback**. He **identified a dealer**, maintained contact with her and saw 3 leopard skins. An operation is planned as a follow-up on the acquired information.
- More contacts were made and collaboration acquired with 2 informers in Douala in connection to the **international trafficking** of a **live hippo** that was sent to the Lahore Zoo in **Pakistan**

Operations

An operation was carried out concerning illegal killing and detaining of a gorilla.

• 15/01/08 – A retired military officer has been arrested in Abong Mbang in the East province trading in gorilla parts. He is now behind bars. The operation took place with the MINFOF Divisional Delegation. The dealer was arrested with gorilla products. The dealer was caught with a consignment of meat from an industrial refrigerator for sale including the legs and heads of gorillas. He attempted to corrupt the arresting officers and has connections to a member of parliament from the area who also **attempted to corrupt the arresting officers** and the State Counsel without success.

Legal

- There are **7 dealers behind bars during this month**: 2 in the Littoral Province; 1 in the Central province, 2 in the West province, 1 in the South West Province and 1 in East Province.
- 26 cases were followed-up by the Legal Department this month (active cases in courts).
- 13 cases are scheduled and being trailed in court this month.
- 1 case is scheduled and being tried in the Court of Appeal Garoua this month (Hassana)
- 7 cases waiting for the process of appeal to reach the court. 4 in the West, 2 in the Littoral and 1 in the South Province (Djoum). The court of first instance has not completed the file needed for the transmission to the Attorney General
- LAGA Legal Department carried out **11 missions** out of the Center Province: 5 in Douala, 1 in Bafang, 1 in Bafoussam, 2 in Abong Mbang, 1 in Mamfe, 1 in Bamenda to follow up operations and cases before the courts.
- One operation was carried out concerning illegal killing and detaining of a gorilla. The operation took place in Abong Mbang with the MINFOF divisional delegation. The dealer was arrested with gorilla products. The suspect has admitted to being the author of the killing of this gorilla and the State counsel decided to keep him in jail while waiting for trial.
- The head of the legal department work with the Interpol on the big ivory case and got us to participate in the high level meeting of heads of Police and Interpol of Central Africa. One thing leads to another and she got the chance to do a full presentation on ivory trafficking during this event.

Media front

- 32 media pieces were produced and pushed through to radio, television and written press including: 5 written press materials (4 in English, 1 in French), 25 radio news flashes (13 in English, 12 in French), 2 TV news features (all in English). 19 media pieces in English, 13 in French making a percentage of 59.4% in English and 40.6% in French.
- Guests include: Minister MINFOF, MINFOF Provincial Delegate North West Province, MINFOF Lawyer Barrister Mbuan and a Traditional Ruler the Fon of Bali.
- Subjects focused on wildlife law enforcement including; 5th edition of wildlife justice now in circulation, Arrest of three elephant dealers in Mamfe, Ecoguard murderer sentenced to 25 years imprisonment-Bangem, Elephant dealers in court-Mamfe, Female dealer in wildlife protected sentenced in Bamenda, Intensification of wildlife enforcement in Cameroon: The role of traditional rulers, Leopard skin dealer arrest, Retired military officer arrested for trading in gorilla meat-Abong Mbang.

External Relations and Policy

- LAGA makes a full presentation at the Central African Head of Police Conference on the fight against wildlife crime and the involvement of the police in this fight. LAGA participated in the high level meeting of Heads of Police and Interpol of Central Africa and was represented by the Head of Legal Department, Horline Njike. She was given the chance to do a full presentation on ivory trafficking during this event. Her work with Interpol on the big ivory case got LAGA to participate in this Conference.
- LAGA met with the Technical Adviser No 1 in MINFOF to discuss issues related to the forwarding of ivory samples for DNA test in laboratories abroad. Focus was on the signing of CITES Permits for the export of samples collected from ivory seized in Yaounde purported to have arrived from a neighbouring country.
- LAGA held a meeting with the Focal Point of CARPE in preparation of the visit of the US Environment Officer for West and Central Africa. The meeting paved the way for the

- visiting Director's audience with the Director of LAGA. LAGA assisted in giving elaborate press coverage to this effect.
- LAGA participated in the High Value Conservation Concept workshop developed by the Forest Stewardship Council and its applicability in the wildlife sector. LAGA helped give the event a press coverage having acknowledged it as a forum where wildlife conservation was being brought into focus in the designation of protected areas.
- LAGA met with the WWF Regional Director in preparation for a visit by the WWF Director who expressed a desire to see the LAGA Director while in Cameroon. The meeting focused on corruption in WWF and actions to be taken. A worker of WWF was implicated in a case of illegal exportation of African Grey parrots from the forests in the South East Cameroon.

Management

• This month, the Head of Legal Department, Horline Njike participated in a conference in U.S.A. on The Administration of Justice for 2 weeks. Civil Law, Administrative Law, and Criminal law were at the centre of many conferences held in different states and within different institutional bodies. She met with one of the highest personalities in the Judiciary System in U.S.A. a Supreme Court Judge, Justice Brian in Washington. The role of civil society, training of judiciary officials, human rights and cultural issues were also discussed. This is a continuation of more involvement of LAGA workers in International seminars and conferences for more capacity building.



Cross-border Crime Preoccupies Judicial Police Directors

The Directors of Judicial Police from the cight-member countries of the Central Africa Police Chiefs Committee (CAPCC), yesterday in Yucunde during their 6th sussion, examined and recommended pertinent actions on ways of righting crime and insecurity, as well as ensuring the effectiveness of Police interventions in the Central African Sub-region.
